I am relatively new to Chesapeake Treasures and I am so happy to serve as your treasurer. As we are all aware, this year is very different than the past years when we could just hand in dues by check at our monthly meetings. From that point, the officers deposit them and move the money around by other checks and mailings.

Since the beginning of September, I have been trying to make this process easier for members and volunteer officers by handling as much of the funds transfer electronically. Initially, we sent out old forms, then revised forms that may have caused confusion. Since our September meeting, with our bravest members, we have figured out our snags with PayPal invoicing.

It is important that we try to streamline this process to be sure our records are clear for auditing purposes. What I have learned since taking office is that electronic invoicing is really easy for me and the members seem to find the payment process easy, too. I can run reports in PayPal to document all payments and can follow the transfers through to BB&T. I am able to then communicate to Joan and Mary Margaret about co-builder deposits and to Sally for membership payments.

Although PayPal is easy for me, I want to assure you that I am not opposed to receiving written checks. I would recommend that <u>Chesapeake Treasures DUES</u> checks be sent directly to me for deposit as that eliminates Sally having to forward them to me. **As before, West River Retreat checks will continue to be sent to Jo Shaw.**

For <u>national SAGA dues</u>, the <u>www.smocking.org</u> website will have the payment button available in late November, and I encourage you to renew directly with them. For those who have sent checks to Sally and me for national SAGA dues, I have deposited them and will send a check to the national treasurer before the due date.

Update: West River retreat February 2021.

The camp is doing everything they can to offer retreats in fall 2020 and spring 2021. They have submitted a plan to the state to allow camping in small groups this fall. No more than two people will be allowed in a sleeping room and limited numbers in the main rooms. They will set out the sewing and cutting tables to meet with distancing requirements. The dining hall may not be open, meaning we may have to supply all meals.

The month before retreat, West River management will contact those registered to answer medical and residence questions. Individual attendees may be rejected right up until the retreat if coming from a HOT county or state or having virus symptoms.

At this time, we are hoping have our retreat with 20 people. As things are still up in the air as to state regulations and possible additional virus breakouts, we are moving ahead with limited registrations and positive thinking. Additional information will continue to come over the next few months.

I have quite a few favorite places to purchase fabric. Right now, when I can not go in and touch the fabrics, I have been purchasing from **Farmhouse Fabrics**. They have been very accommodating and I have received all of my packages very timely as they have said! And the fabrics are always packaged so nicely, tied up in a pretty bow! I recently placed a large order with many similar fabrics. Each was neatly folded with a description of the fabric attached! More than I expected!

I have also made several trips for curbside pick-up service at **A Fabric Place** on Falls Road in Baltimore County. Michael, Johnathon, Debbie and Sherrie are always eager to please and make sure you are happy with your choices! They were even mailing elastic to me when I was up to my ears in mask making!

I had one very unhappy experience this past Spring, when I placed an order online with **iFabric.com**. I will never purchase from them again and can say that while the prices were very low, their service was deplorable! After allowing 2 weeks for delivery, I began calling the number listed on their website, only to find that it had been disconnected! They never answered any of my emails and about 2 months later they sent me an email to let me know my fabric was on the way! There was no way to cancel the order. When the package arrived there was a print out with the list of fabrics that were sent. There were 2 pieces missing. The same day the order arrived so did an email letting me know that they had refunded my bank card for the missing fabrics. The only good thing is that I finally have the fabric to make costumes for a church play that has now been postponed indefinitely! Worst experience getting fabric ever! Kathy F.

Meet A Treasure - Joan S. Messinger

Joan is originally from New York. She has two sons by her first marriage and during her second marriage gained a large family by extending her heart to a family with six girls. All the children call her GG or GG Joan.

Her maternal grandmother was a professional seamstress. She taught Joan to hand sew and embroider but she had to wait until high school to use a sewing machine in a home economics class. Her father bought her mother, sister and her a Singer Feather Weight machine for Christmas in 1945. Making a skirt was the beginning of her machine sewing odyssey.

Joan learned to smock 40 years ago when her first two granddaughters were born. Purchasing a "Polly Flinders" was prohibitive, as it was the cost of a month's salary. In the fall of 1980, when the community college smocking class she enrolled in was cancelled, she found out who was to teach the class and contacted her. The teacher (Judy Gravitts) agreed to teach 8 people at her home.

This class was the beginning of Joan's career in smocking. Halfway through the course she purchased her 16 Needle Read pleater. Once she found out there were teachers of smocking who came to the fabric store in Clinton to teach, she was able to take classes with Elizabeth Travis Johnson and Florence Roberson. Both were Master Teachers for SAGA. The classes also taught construction of garments with smocked inserts, as well as bishop construction by machine, both before and after smocking.

Joan found her way to SAGA through a shop in Crofton where Barbara Meger taught smocking. Ironically, there was a new group started, which just happened to be Chesapeake Treasures, and Joan found her way there in September 1989.

Joan enjoys doing Shadow Work embroidery and has had 2 sets of her directions accepted as SAGA Stitches Programs. You can find them on the National SAGA Website.

She learned to do machine embroidery on her Viking SE. For the last 10 years she has made our Annual Chesapeake Treasures totes for the West River Retreat.

Joan has taken cooking and baking classes from Wilton making wedding and birthday cakes for family and neighbors. She took classes in England at the Royal School of Needlework. She has gone to 27 SAGA National Conventions and 9 SAGA National Seminars, as well as 21 Sewing at the Beach Workshops.

If Joan had a free day to do whatever she wanted, she would take a trip. She might travel to England, or swim in Hawaii or just visit her oldest friend who is no longer able to walk.

I'll leave you with a word of wisdom from Joan, "You are never too old to learn. Keep your eyes and hands in good condition. Listen, look and try something new."
